Primary Team Update

When the lockdown first began, we were on the cusp of our Easter Prayer Spaces project. We had a number of schools booked in that we were going to visit and run prayer activities. Unfortunately, due to the tactile nature of this project, we decided to postpone Prayer Spaces for the safety of all of our children. But this did spark an idea. In a time of stress and uncertainty, could families make a prayer space at home to help them take time out and talk to God?

We decided to start writing up our prayer spaces ideas (and inspiration

from other sources) to post to our website's schools blog so that anyone who wanted to, could access them. As a whole team we then decided to do even more, aware that so many young people are now homeschooling. We were also very aware that the year 6 children, leaving primary school, will be going through an even harder transition than in other years. Normally, we would work with schools in our MOUSE (Moving On Up to Secondary Education) lessons to help them through this time, but of course we can't do that in the usual way at the moment. So, we decided to record these lessons instead and make them available online. with downloadable work sheets and activities. They are all published on our Youtube channel and we're praying that they can be a blessing to these young people as they face



Secondary Schools Team Update



At lunchtime on Thursday 12th March some of our ICE team were in St Peter's with the Christian Union. We were helping prepare them for an outreach event they wanted to hold before Easter, when one of our students asked, "what if school gets closed?" I chuckled.

Firstly, because I thought it was a funny idea that we would still come and do the event with the school closed, but secondly, the idea that the school would be closed seemed ridiculous to me. And yet, 7 days later, CU had only its year 7 members as the school was closed to all others, to be closed to all non-key workers children after that. This sadly meant that Karen, Karin and Danielle, three of our incredible team who have served so amazingly this year, had to go back to Brazil, Germany and Barnstaple respectively earlier than planned. However, through the wonders of modern technology, we have still been able to meet and work as a

unprecedented challenge has been incredible and I feel very lucky to be part of such a team. Since Easter, every week we have sent out two videos to reach the young people with whom we were sadly unable to meet. On Tuesdays, we have a Thought For the Week, which aims to provoke young people to think about their lives and how the teachings of Christianity might both comfort them and challenge them to start asking the big questions in life. On Thursdays, we Think Big, asking those hard questions of faith. Why has God allowed all this suffering to happen? How can I love my neighbour when I have to keep at least 2 metres apart from them? and other such questions. You can watch all of these videos on our ICE YouTube channel.



Whilst we haven't been able to get much feedback yet from our young people directly, we have had great feedback from our schools. One of the head of years told me: "We are really grateful for the time all of you are spending recording the videos." These videos have also been appreciated and shared in Cranbook, a school we have only had limited contact with in recent years, and may well be a great stepping stone for us to do more in that school, being able to reach more young people with the good news of Jesus.

Our next goal is to make our videos more interactive and more appealing to young people. Unfortunately, we still don't know at this point whether we will be back in school in September. Therefore we need to continue to be creative and strive to reach young people, however we can.

Lastly, I want to say thank you to all of you who have been covering our work in prayer over these past few months. It has been very challenging, but we are so thankful for all of your support, we could not do this without you.

Transforming Lives for Good Mentoring

Lockdown came at a frustrating moment for lots of reasons, one of which is that we hoped to have mentors starting in St James after the Easter holidays, which sadly could not happen. But there is good news! Whilst our mentoring program set-up has slowed down, it has not paused. We are still in conversations with both St James and West Exe schools and doing some of the background set up that we need to do like DBS checks for our mentoring team. The schools are still keen, and are aware that young people will have found this time very difficult and will be potentially in more need of the support we can provide.

We don't know yet when we will definitely be in school working with young people, but we are getting ready so that when that does happen we are ready to start transforming lives for good.

Nationally, TLG's mentoring project is continuing, though in a different capacity. Remote coaching has taken over from face-to-face coaching, which is, of course, impossible at the moment. This involves mentors writing letters, designing activities that can be done at home and, where possible, short video chats over a parents phone. Do check out the TLG website for more details on how they have been coping with this crisis and how you can support and pray for them.

We currently have 5 mentors trained and are ready to start work as soon as schools are ready. But we are still looking for more. TLG will be running training again in the autumn, either online or in person, so if you are over 18, love Jesus and have an hour a week to see a young person's life transformed for good, then do email me at doug.owen@icetrust.co.uk.

Staff meet weekly online for a staff meeting, to pray together and plan for how they can "do ICE differently" and they certainly have delivered video footage that is very engaging (often relevant to adults as well). A trustee joins them once a month, or as and when required, to keep in touch and give them pastoral support and encouragement. Having said that they are also a huge encouragement to us!
